President's Message

The profession has recently lost two of its eminent practitioners. Ian McHarg, FASLA, and Bruce Kulik, FASLA, both passed away a couple of weeks ago. Ian was internationally known for his landmark book *Design with Nature*, and his leadership in the environmental planning effort. He taught landscape architecture and regional planning for many years at the University of Pennsylvania.

Bruce Kulik, FASLA, died suddenly of heart failure preparing for a planning board meeting. He was 61. He was principal in the firm of Miceli Kulik Williams and Associates, PC, a landscape architectural and urban design firm with offices in Rutherford, New Jersey and New York City.

Inducted to the 1995 to Class of Fellows, ASLA, Bruce was nominated for his executed works of landscape architecture, based on exceptional achievements in design and project management, completed works that reveal individuality and mastery of the art of landscape architecture, and projects that demonstrate outstanding quality and professional leadership. He and his firm have won numerous design awards for their work.

Bruce received his Bachelor of Science in Landscape Architecture from Michigan State University and his Associate Degree in Applied Sciences in Ornamental Horticulture from the State University of New York.

He is survived by Alberta, his wife of 41 years, his daughter, two sons and six grandchildren.

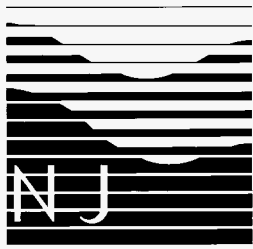

LA Law

Senate Bill S-2112, also known as The Closely Allied Professional Bill, was introduced to the State of NJ Legislature on February 15, 2001, and was heard at the March 8, 2001, meeting of the Senate Commerce Committee. The bill includes Certified Landscape Architects as Closely Allied Professionals in the Architect's Licensing Law and in the law creating the Joint Committee of Architects and Engineers. Both NJASLA President Carl E. Hintz and Past-President Jay Cosentino were present at the hearing to provide testimony in support of the bill if necessary.

However, the bill was unanimously passed by the Committee, 3-0, with no opposition or comment. Senate Bill S-2112 now goes before the State Senate for approval. If successful in the Senate, the bill will proceed to the State Assembly for approval. The bill was sponsored by State Senator Peter Inverso. Our Chapter Association Manager, Joe Simonetta, was responsible for introducing the bill to the Senate Commerce Committee. As you will recall, the passage of this bill is one of the goals listed in the 1998 Chapter Strategic Plan.
